



# Climate Readiness and Community Recovery

The hottest day ever recorded in Canada was 49.6°C in 2021 in Lytton, BC. Due to climate change and temperature variances, extreme weather incidents — such as tornados, wildfires and floods — are on the rise across Canada. When these events happen, local governments must lead immediate response efforts while also tackling the enormous task of recovering and rebuilding their communities. That's in addition to continuing to provide local services.

## Proactive climate readiness

At its core, a community recovery project is demanding and stressful. By investing in proactive climate readiness planning local governments can effectively mitigate the destructive impact of climate change and safeguard their communities. Project management processes play a key role in planning, coordination, resource management and response efforts to effectively address extreme weather events. This involves conducting thorough risk assessments to identify vulnerabilities, developing comprehensive readiness plans complete with specific procedures and responsibilities, and educating the public about potential hazards and necessary precautions.

Additionally, establishing resilient infrastructure and fostering collaborative partnerships with relevant stakeholders can enhance local governments' capacity to respond to community needs swiftly and efficiently, reducing economic losses.

## Focused, disciplined recovery planning

Every recovery project is unique and presents its own challenges. Recovery planning and delivery involves balancing more urgent community needs with the work required to mobilize critical resources, obtain funding and deploy teams to deliver results. In the aftermath of a disaster, governments must consider short-term needs, such as restoring roads and other critical infrastructure. Simultaneously, they must assess infrastructure requirements – such as setting up temporary housing and fixing damaged water and sewage systems – and initiating longer-term efforts, including recovering lost municipal data and building more resilient, sustainable infrastructure that can better withstand future extreme weather events.

By bringing in an experienced team of project managers and recovery experts to support and execute restoration efforts throughout the entire rehabilitation process, you and your team can stay focused on the needs of your community knowing recovery efforts are continuing even with ongoing staff burnout and high turnover.

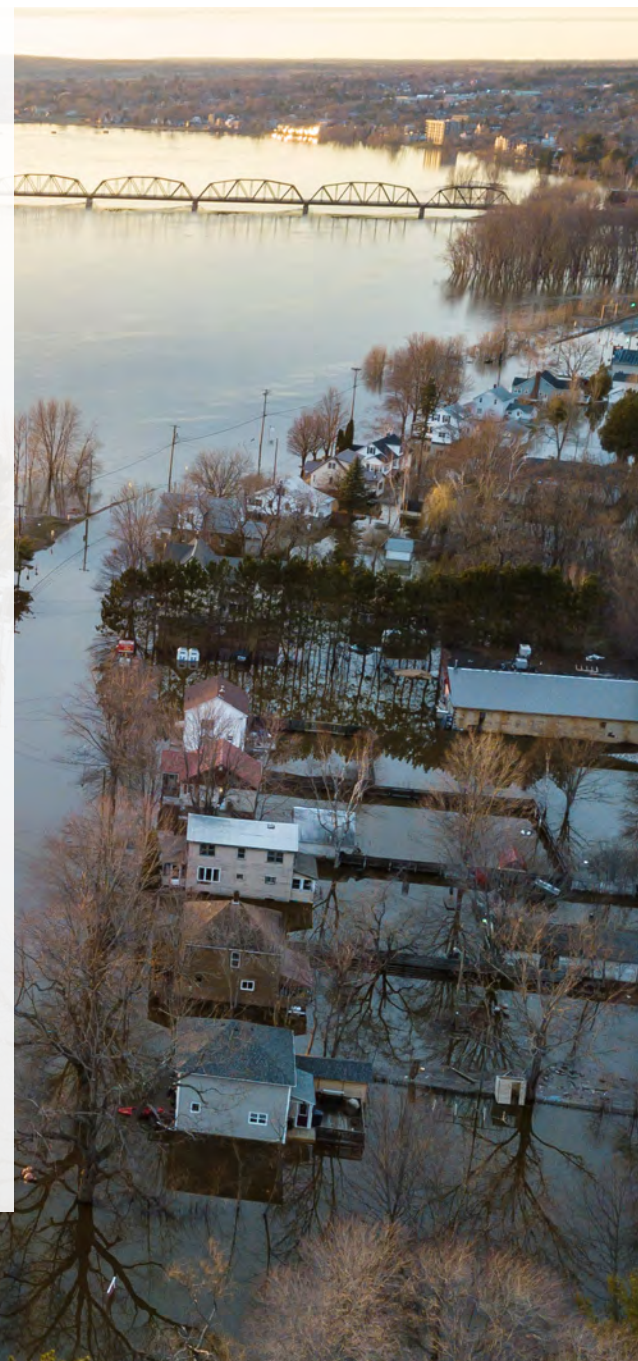

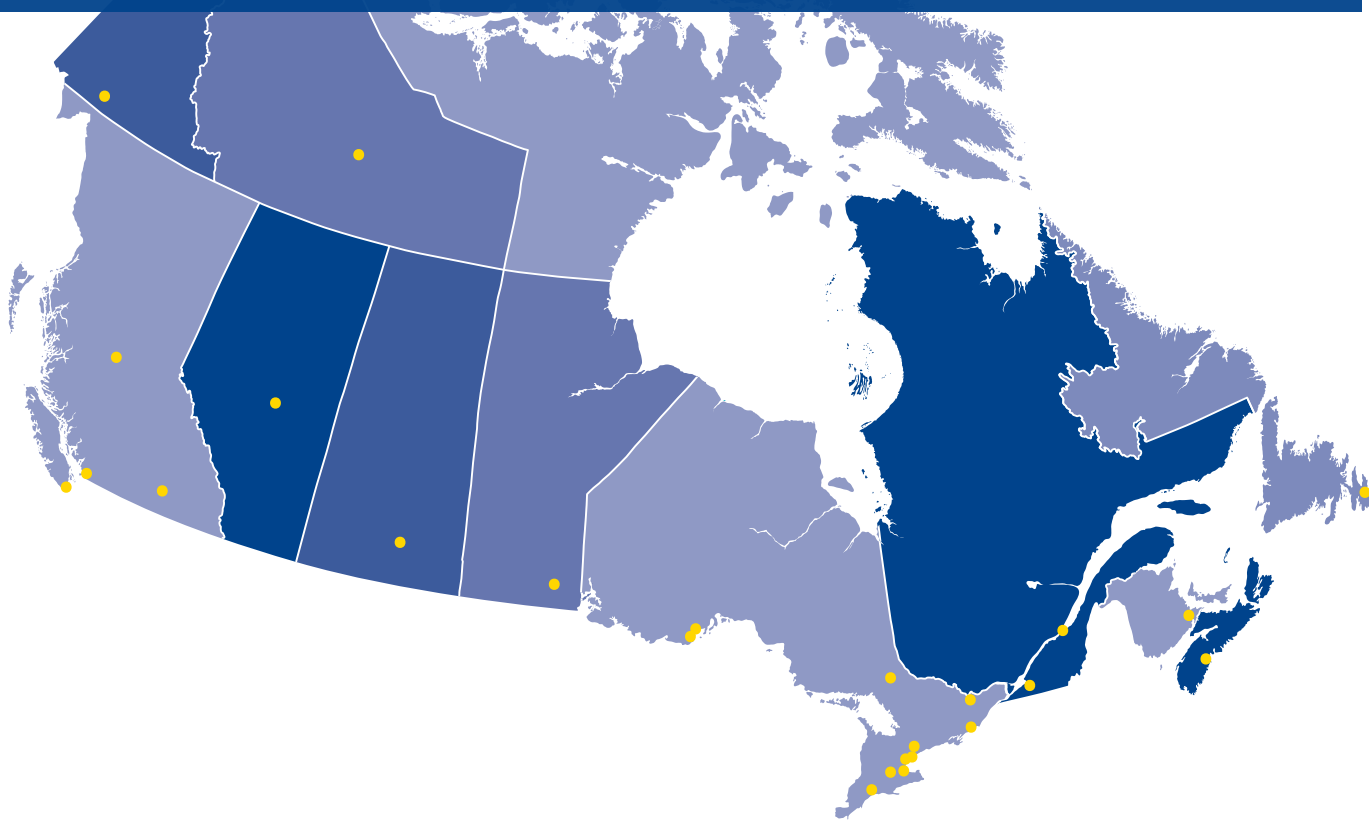
